

In a past Rotaract JPM, one of the topics raised in the Training Session is the importance of punctuality. The Rotaractors had even produced a video on it and posted the video on its Facebook page as one topic for 'training'! What one might think is a matter of course, now has to be ... refreshed, to put it mildly.

For some time, it was taken for granted that authors, decorators and tailors are the vocations which always 'delay' in completion. If an author, or a decorator or a tailor tells you he has finished half the job, it usually means he has not started. If he tells you he is about to finish, that means he has begun to work on the matter. If he asks you to go and see the finished product in a while, that means he has finished almost half of it. If you really go and take a look, he will still be working on it and says he is applying the finishing touches.





Nowadays, delays seem to have spread like germs and are not limited to those 3 vocations. So, I guess no one was really surprised with the delay in completion of the Guangzhou-Shenzhen-Hong Kong Express Rail. It is a massive project and seriously, no one would be nazve to think it could be finished on time. Still remember the time when the then new Government offices were said to have been completed and urged civil servants to move in? My civil servant friend had had

a hard time wearing masks every day for fear of inhaling the dust and dirt. She had seriously considered getting herself a helmet for fear of dropping debris.

The launch of new mobile phones is another example. Smart customers would now wait a bit because they know the first batch products are likely plagued by teething problems (or "bugs") due to the rush to meet the launching deadline. They would require subsequent fixing.





Similarly, new car models almost inevitably encounter problems soon after leaving the manufacturers. They usually need to have different parts fixed in about a year's time. Again, the result of the rush.



A small segment of the road might be said to require 3 months to work on when 1 month would be more than enough!

If the project or the works require minimal skill or expertise, one's toleration threshold is pretty low. But if the matter hinges on precise quality or safety, I guess most people will have a lot more patience.

Also, some delays are understandable. For instance, if there is snow storm or severe thunderstorm, or an airplane safety is in issue, I'd rather be late than never! I will not blame the Airlines for taking the time to ensure safety. Life is far more important than any rush. After all, if safely arrived, you can pursue a claim about the delay anytime.



Time is a strange creature. Depending on the situation, delay may cause catastrophe; but it may also heal anger / wounds.

Rotary celebrates three decades of PolioPlus

This year marks the 30th year since Rotary launched PolioPlus, its campaign to rid the world of polio. Beginning on Rotary's anniversary, 23 February, Rotary members worldwide will be holding events to celebrate three decades of polio eradication progress.

During a speech to Rotary leaders in February 1985, then Rotary President Dr. Carlos Canseco announced what he considered "the biggest news in Rotary" — the commitment to help control polio worldwide. Since that day, Rotary's dedication to the global eradication of polio has remained constant. 2015 marks the 30th anniversary of PolioPlus and three decades of progress and challenges the program has faced.



PolioPlus



Though the PolioPlus program started in 1985, Rotary began the fight against polio much earlier. In 1979 Rotary members began a multiyear program that immunized more than 6 million children in the Philippines against polio. Polio eradication became a top priority to Rotary after urging by Canseco, Dr. John Sever and Dr. Albert Sabin. Sever, a Rotary club leader, was the head of the infectious diseases branch of the National Institute of Neurological and Communicative Diseases and Stroke at the National Institutes of Health. As the developer of the oral polio vaccine, Sabin gave Rotary International the program a globally respected figure.

With their medical backgrounds, the three became crucial spokespeople for the program. Sabin argued against the traditional country-by-country approach advocated by the World Health Organization and others in the public health community. He called it "charity," saying that "what's needed are annual, well-organized — I repeat, the key is well-organized — community campaigns for mass vaccination of all children under four or five years of age." Sever, Canseco and others joined Sabin in advocating for mass immunization.

Sever believed his fellow Rotary members meet the challenge of polio eradication, calling them a "big international army of volunteers." He also helped Rotary secure a special designation as a nongovernmental organization affiliated with WHO in order to shape the PolioPlus program.


In its early years, PolioPlus was dedicated to fundraising for immunization efforts. In May 1988 Rotary announced that the campaign, which aimed to raise \$120 million, had raised nearly \$220 million in contributions and pledges. That same year, the World Health Assembly set a goal of worldwide polio eradication and launched the **Global Polio Eradication Initiative** (GPEI) with Rotary as one of its partners. At the time, polio paralyzed more than 1,000 children worldwide every day and 125 countries were polio-endemic.

The GPEI partners, which also included WHO, UNICEF, and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, were able to boost world immunization levels from less than 50 percent in 1985 to over 80 percent in 1992. Just five years after the GPEI was founded, the 500 millionth child was immunized against polio. To further efforts, Rotary started the PolioPlus Partners program in 1995, to fund and support National Immunization Days in polio-endemic countries.

In 2007 Rotary entered into a partnership with the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, which issued Rotary a \$100 million challenge grant to raise funds for polio eradication. This partnership continued to grow, and in 2013 the Gates Foundation offered to match Rotary's contributions for polio eradication 2-to-1 for five years (up to \$35 million per year).

Rotary Today: Since the launch of the GPEI, the global incidence of polio cases has decreased by 99 percent. In March 2014 India, once deemed the most difficult place to end polio, was declared polio-free, making the entire Southeast Region polio-free.

As of February 11, Africa had no new cases of wild poliovirus in six months, though the continent must mark three full years without a new case to be officially declared poliofree by WHO. Until polio is stopped in the remaining endemic areas, all countries must maintain high levels of surveillance and immunization rates to rapidly detect any importation of the poliovirus and minimize its impact. Now that 99 percent of the world's population lives in regions certified polio-free, the goal of eradication is closer than ever.















A Tale of Two Debuts














A Date with Portugal and Spain Wanda Ngan



After visiting Porto, we went to Fatima. It was said that the Blessed Virgin Mary, the mother of God, appeared six times to the three shepherd children near Fatima between May 13 and October 13, 1917.



Before visiting Obidos, we went to the western most extent of mainland Portugal, Cabo da Roca. There is a lighthouse overlooking the promontory towards the Atlantic Ocean. Obidos was said to be the wedding gift to the queen and is the most classic walled settlement in Portugal. Similar to Obidos, Evora is still partially enclosed by medieval walls, and there are large numbers of monuments dating from various historical period, including a Roman Temple. Evora is a UNESCO World Heritage Site.



We can still see British influence. It is a windy city too. A lot of monkeys live up the hill. Gibraltar is made of limestone and we saw beautiful limestone caves.



From Gibraltar, we travelled to Mijas which is also known as the white city. We were attracted by the craft shops locating on its narrow cobbled streets. Departing the white city, we visited the Alhambra Palace. Alhambra means red in Arabian language. Alhambra is a palace and fortress located in Granada. Consuegra is famous for its windmills. They usually consisted of two rooms or levels. Toledo was the second Unesco Heritage Site that we visited in this trip.





Before entering Madrid, we visited Segovia. The Roman aqueduct is the symbol of this city. We have a chance to visit the stadium of Real Madrid Football Club. Valencia was our next stop. It was the third largest city in Spain. We can see modern constructions in this ancient city.




















Besides enjoying the scenery, blue sky and fresh air, we also had Spanish cuisine which was less tasty than Chinese food.

Frankie's talk was so interesting that PDG Kenneth could not resist but to volunteer a sincere vote of thanks and commended Frankie on his 'giving' attitude.




March birthday boys and girl: Jimmy (with Annie), Ping (with Angela) and Caren celebrated their birthdays amidst members' birthday songs.


