



Have you ever wondered like I do: why do I have a variety of friends who are all so different in character? How is it possible that I can get along with them all? I think that each friend helps to bring out a "different" part of me. With one of them I am polite. With another I joke. With yet another I can be a bit naughty. I can sit down and talk about serious matters with one. With another I laugh a lot. I listen to one friend's problems and give advice or comfort. Then I listen to another one's advice for me.

The warmth of friendship stops stress even in your most intense moments, and decreases the chances of strokes – maybe Dr. CM can help verify if this is true.

Six women recognized at United Nations for leadership, humanitarian service

The six Rotary Global Women of Action for 2015 were recognized during Rotary Day at the United Nations on 7 November in New York City for their dedication and service, which have improved the lives of thousands around the world.



"The women we are honoring here today are leaders in Rotary," said Rotary President K.R. Ravindran. "They are pushing the boundaries of Rotary service, pushing us all to do more, be more, and achieve more."

Lakshmi Puri, assistant secretary-general of the United Nations and deputy executive director of UN Women, praised Rotary for its acknowledgment of the crucial role women play.

"I'm very pleased you have picked this team of gender equality and women empowerment," she said.

The six women, who were selected by Rotary senior leaders and staff from more than 100 nominees from around the world, are:



Dr. Hashrat A. Begum, of the Rotary Club of Dhaka North West, in Bangladesh, who has implemented several large-scale projects to deliver health care to poor and underserved communities.

Stella S. Dongo, of the Rotary Club of Highlands, in Zimbabwe, who leads the Community Empowerment Project in the city of Harare. The project provides basic business and computer training to more than 6,000 women and youths affected by HIV/AIDS.

Lucy C. Hobgood-Brown, of the Rotary E-Club of Greater Sydney, in New South Wales, Australia, who co-founded HandUp Congo, a nonprofit that promotes and facilitates sustainable community-driven business, educational, social, and health initiatives in underprivileged communities in the Democratic Republic of Congo.

Razia Jan, of the Rotary Club of Duxbury, in Massachusetts, USA, who has spent decades fighting for girls' educational rights in Afghanistan. An Afghan native, she is the founder and director of the Zabuli Education Center, a school that provides free education to more than 480 girls in Deh'Subz, outside Kabul, Afghanistan. She was also recognized as a CNN Hero in 2012.


Kerstin Jeska-Thorwart, of the Rotary Club of Nürnberg-Sigena, in Germany, who launched the Babyhospital Galle project after surviving the 2004 tsunami in Sri Lanka. With a budget of \$1.8 million and the support of 200 Rotary clubs, the project rebuilt and equipped the Mahamodara Teaching Hospital, in Galle, Sri Lanka. The hospital has served more than 150,000 children and more than 2.2 million women.

Dr. Deborah K.W. Walters, of the Rotary Club of Unity, in Maine, USA, a neuroscientist who has served as director of Safe Passage (Camino Seguro), a nonprofit that provides educational and social services to families who live in the Guatemala City garbage dump.

Each of the women addressed attendees and led discussions on topics related to her work.

More than 1,000 Rotary members, UN officials, Rotary youth program participants, and guests gathered at this year's annual event, which celebrated 70 years of partnership between Rotary and the UN. A morning youth session was open to high school students, including members of Rotary's Interact and Youth Exchange programs.

Guest speakers included Fabia Yazaki, acting chief for evaluation and communications in the UN's department of public information; Karin Ryan, senior project adviser for the human rights program at the Carter Center; Ambassador at-Large Susan Coppedge Amato, director of the Office to Monitor and Combat Trafficking in Persons for the U.S. Department of State; Melissa Russell, vice president of strategic partnerships for the International Justice Mission; Jeffrey Kluger, Time magazine editor at-large; and Archie Panjabi, Emmy Award-winning actress and Rotary polio ambassador.

MY HOLIDAYS IN CAUCASUS

Many people know that I always travel to Japan for holidays. However I did something different during 19 Sep to 1 Oct. Margie and I travelled to Caucasus which is not a familiar place to many people. Caucasus is a region at the border of Europe and Asia, situated between the Black and the Caspian seas. It is at the North of the railway under the "one region one road" to be built joining PRC and East Europe. and East Europe.

It is home to the Caucasus Mountains, which contains Europe's highest mountain, Mount Elbrus. Politically, the Caucasus region is separated between northern and southern parts. The southern parts consist of independent sovereign states, and the northern parts are under the jurisdiction of the Russian Federation. The region is known for its linguistic diversity: aside from Indo-European and Turkic languages, the Kartvelian, Northwest Caucasian, and Northeast Caucasian families are indigenous to the area. Basically my trip covered Azerbaijan, Georgia and Armenia which proclaimed their independence in 1990/1991.




Azerbaijan

After gaining independence in 1991, Azerbaijan became a member of the International Monetary Fund, the World Bank, the European Bank for Reconstruction and Development, the Islamic Development Bank and the Asian Development Bank. The banking system of Azerbaijan consists of the Central Bank of Azerbaijan, commercial banks and non-banking credit organizations. Azerbaijan is also ranked 57th in the Global Competitiveness Report for 2010–2011, which is above other CIS countries. By 2012 the GDP of Azerbaijan increased 20-fold relative to its 1995 level. Coupled with the prosperous industrial developments, particularly in aluminum sector, Azerbaijan has wonderful commercial developments as evidenced in the city view in the picture.

Georgia

Archaeological research demonstrates that Georgia has been involved in commerce with many lands and empires since ancient times, largely due to its location on the Black Sea and later on the historical Silk Road. Gold, silver, copper and iron have been mined in the Caucasus Mountains. Georgian wine making is a very old tradition and a key branch of the country's economy. The country has sizable hydropower resources. Throughout Georgia's modern history, agriculture and tourism have been principal economic sectors, because of the country's climate and topography. For much of the 20th century, Georgia's economy was within the Soviet model of command economy. Since the fall of the USSR in 1991, Georgia embarked on a major structural reform designed to transit to a free market economy. It is said that Georgians were so named because they revered Saint George





Svetitskhoveli, known as the burial site of Christ's mantle, has long been the principal Georgian church and remains one of the most venerated places of worship to this day. It presently functions as the seat of the archbishop of Mtskheta and Tbilisi, who is at the same time Catholicons-Patriarch of All Georgia.







Armenia

Armenia was the first nation to adopt Christianity as a state religion, an event traditionally dated to AD 301. The predominant religion in Armenia is Christianity. The roots of the Armenian Church go back to the 1st century. According to tradition, the Armenian Church was founded by two of Jesus' twelve apostles – Thaddaeus and Bartholomew – who preached Christianity in Armenia between AD 40–60. Because of these two founding apostles, the official name of the Armenian Church is Armenian Apostolic Church. The key activity in Armenia is to pay visit to many churches. One famous church we went to was the monastery Echmiadzin, which is the center of the Armenian Church.



FOOD



Azerbaijan

The traditional cuisine of Azerbaijan is famous for an abundance of vegetables and greens used seasonally in the dishes. Fresh herbs, including mint, cilantro (coriander), dill, basil, parsley, tarragon, leeks, chives, thyme, marjoram, green onion, and watercress, are very popular and often accompany main dishes on the table. Popular traditional dishes include bozbash (lamb soup that exists in several regional varieties with the addition of different vegetables), qutab (fried turnover with a filling of greens or minced meat) and dushbara (sort of dumplings of dough filled with ground meat and flavor).

Georgia

The Georgian cuisine is specific to the country, but also contains some influences from the European and Middle Eastern culinary traditions, as well as those of the surrounding Western Asia. The cuisine offers a variety of dishes with various herbs and spices.



Armenia

Armenian cuisine is as ancient as the history of Armenia, a combination of different tastes and aromas. The food often has quite a distinct aroma. Closely related to eastern and Mediterranean cuisine, various spices, vegetables, fish, and fruits combine to present unique dishes. The main characteristics of Armenian cuisine are a reliance on the quality of the ingredients rather than heavily spicing food, the use of herbs, the use of wheat in a variety of forms, of legumes, nuts, and fruit (as a main ingredient as well as to sour food), and the stuffing of a wide variety of leaves.

We had lunch in the restaurant run by Cross Armenian Unity 1990. The cook, waiters/waitresses and shop keepers are handicapped or mentally retarded boys and girls. The table clothes are hand made by them. It illustrates the spirit of Rotarians in Armenian.







The Balkan Peninsula

Can you say that again? Where were you going? Where on earth is that? I fielded such questions a number of times before I started on my trip to the Balkans, and, yes, after I returned. Well, it is definitely a less-travelled destination for Hong Kong people but you should have heard about it being mentioned recently as there are influx of refugees from Syria. Now, it rings a bell doesn't it?

The Balkan Peninsula is SLOVENIA actually on south east Europe and comprises 9 (well, some say 12) countries. My 12-day trip Mid-autumn started on night. I visited 5 of those



countries and learned quite a bit about their geography, history, religion and ethnicity.

Croatia

We started with the more affluent country Croatia and visited its capital **Zagreb**, touring the city and the cathedral.

We also spent a couple of days at the more scenic and touristy parts of Croatia, like the Plitvice Lakes National Parks (UNESCO) - better known as the "16 Lakes" in Opatija; and Krka National Park which is regarded as the most beautiful place in Croatia. Trust me, the is not bit description exaggerated: the scenes are really tranquil and breathtaking.





Split is a famous resort area and featured the Dioklecijanova Palace. Of course it is no longer a palace but a harbour side Old Town where tourists enjoy the sun, the leisurely cup of coffee, the fresh seafood and the occasional art / music exhibitions.





Dubrovnik is another renowned resort where the wealthy people all around the world go by planes or pleasure boats to take advantage of the beautiful Old Town and sea breezes of



the Adriatic Sea. A stroll along the city wall of the Old Town gave us a birds-eye view of the whole town which had weathered wars and upheavals and was only reconstructed in recent years with the support from the United Nations. The junk trip allowed us to view this idyllic town from an entirely different angle.









Slovenia

In Slovenia, we toured its capital and largest city, Ljubljana and strolled along the town center marked by the famous 3 bridges through which the Ljubljana River flows. The symbol of the city is the Ljubljana Dragon.

Taking a small train ride we also ventured into the immense stalactite caves known as Postojna Caves. Somehow it felt like being inside Space Mountain! cannot help but marvel at the might of nature.







Montenegro

The old Mediterranean port of **Kotor** is located on the Bay of Kotor, one of the most indented parts of the Adriatic Sea in Montenegro. The Kotor Old Town is one of the best preserved medieval old towns in the Adriatic and a World Heritage Site. The footprints of history, religion and architecture are everywhere. Within this little coastal old town, there are the Serbian Orthodox Church, Montenegrin Orthodox Church, Church of Our Lady of Health, Cathedral of Saint Tryphon and the Kotor Cathedral. The different religions appear in harmony. The only thing which looks rather out-of-place is the 'shark' in the moat!







Still in Montenegro and on the way to the sea side old town **Budva**, we passed by the Sveti Stefan (or St. Stephen Island) and noted the properties and holiday houses of some of the world's wealthiest people. Former Thai prime minister, the wealthy fugitive Taksin, has a house there.



Bosnia and Herzegovina

Bosnia and Herzegovina is home to three main ethnic groups: the Bosniaks are the largest, the Serbs second, and Croats third. This country shoulders pivotal importance in both World Wars and numerous other battles and does not seem to have recovered even in this day and age. While the old town Mostar features some of the more prominent touristy spots like the Old Bridge and the Crooked Bridge (both damaged and rebuilt), its capital, Sarajevo, looks worn and torn and peppered with the relics of war and damage.









As the country is cash-strapped and war-worn, there are obvious social and economic problems. Notably, there are quite a lot of gypsies loitering around.







Serbia

The last country on this trip is Serbia. **Novi Sad**, its second largest city and capital of the Vojvodina province, is known affectionately as the Serbian Athens. The 200 odd steps climb up its **Petrovaradin Fortress** was well worth it as we took a birds-eye view of the whole city.





Serbia's capital **Belgrade**, by comparison, is a pretty forlorn capital. I am not particularly impressed by the new grand Orthodox Cathedral even though there are quite a collection of paintings of the saints inside the smaller old one. What might have saved the day was when we were atop the **Belgrade Fortress** and took in the beautiful confluence of the River Sava into the River Danube.







That's the Balkans

The home-bound plane had to transit via Munich, so I had had the benefit of a full 4 hours in the airport to go over bits and pieces of the trip in my mind. Food-wise, they have Arabian and Turkish influence and lean towards serving seafood.



Their languages (Slavac, Roman, Turkish, Greek ...) are definitely foreign to me and English is not really useful there. In Croatia (where we spent the bulk of the journey), the currency used is Kuna (denoted as 'kn') rather than Euro. In Bosnia and Herzegovina, their currency is 'Marka' and is denoted by a confusingly similar 'km'. I had not bothered to exchange



for the Serbian Dinar ('RSD') and so had not been able to buy anything in Serbia, not that I had something in mind anyway.

The most prominent scenes / descriptions used, indeed time and again in this write-up, are "Old Town". This trip is really about historic sites and natural sceneries. As we walk through old towns one after another, we learnt about their history and witnessed the traces of wars that they had weathered, mostly sparked off either because of religious conflicts or trade advantages.

And yes, I did come across the refugees; but it was on the last day and soon before we left Belgrade. The Syrian refugees were actually camping (I was told the tents were supplied by the UN) in a park in the city centre. They looked orderly and not too much of an eye-sore. Looking at them and the surroundings, I have a strange feeling that with the flux of time, we are actually painting the future historic scenes. Decades and centuries later, tourists will be commenting or reminiscing on what took place today.



You are still wondering ... alright, here you go: the Balkan countries cover Croatia, Montenegro, Slovenia, Bosnia and Herzegovina and Serbia, the 5 countries where I had been to; together with the other four which may be for next trip: Albania, Romania, Bulgaria and the Republic of Macedonia. Some say Greece, Kosovo and the Europe part of Turkey also belong to the Balkans, but that's not really for me to clarify.



"Sunshine Teens" Project - Abseiling Event and PTA

As freshmen, Form 1 students can be easily induced and they are vulnerable to peer's influence. When they are under the stress from adversities, like peer's instigation, boredom, academic pressure, grieved romance, etc., they tend to use radical approaches in problem solving and stress reducing.

Our Sunshine Teens project aims to provide positive and proactive training activities for students who are in need of guidance, so as to improve their time management skill, to assist them in self-understanding, and to convince them to have a healthy and proactive lifestyle. Through this project, they will establish a healthy and caring campus culture under positive peer's influence. The freshmen will be accompanied by mentors and good friends, and enjoy the new beginning of secondary school life.

On the 23rd Oct 2015 at N.T. Heung Yee Kuk Tai Po District Secondary School, we had The Abseiling Event as a part of Sunshine Teens project. Abseiling is a controlled descent of a vertical drop with a rope. Climbers use this technique to descend from a high place. The participants must be brave enough to complete abseiling by themselves. On the same day it was also the Parent-Teacher Association Annual Conference cum Parents Gathering. Ms. Yeung, teacher from N.T. Heung Yee Kuk Tai Po District Secondary School, launched the abseiling event. Nearly 50 freshmen, participants of "Sunshine Teens" Project, lined up at SAC on 5th floor and awaiting to meet the great challenge. Even under the supervision of professional abseilers, teenagers struggled with their self-confidence before descending to the ground floor, which was approximately a 20-meter abseiling. It was not easy to have such determination, but all freshmen finished the event without quitting.
